




"A football trophy would look nice alongside of our baseball and golf prizes,' mused a Taft booster yesterday as he watched the northwest side prep Eagles soar like champions over their practice field at 5625 N. Natoma av.

Joe Kupcinet, who has directed Taft's football teams since 1939, the year the high school was opened, looked up, grinning. "Yes," he agreed, "that would be quite nice."

A title would be a crowning reward for Kupcinet, who has had success in the 18 years he has coached Taft, despite failure to win a league championship.







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




This past fall our football team played its first season in the red division. Even against better teams for the first time, Taft lost only once in league play. This was to Austin, the school that eventually won the city championship.




