


WORLD NEWS of the YEAR 1958

- Nikita Khrushchev becomes Premier of the U.S.S.R.
- France approves the creation of a new government, "The Fifth Republic"; Charles de Gaulle the new President.
- In Tokyo, Japanese break tradition, letting Prince Akihito choose his own bride.
- In London, Queen Elizabeth gives Prince Charles the title of Prince of Wales.
- Prince Charles, son of Elizabeth II and future husband of Diana, becomes the Prince of Wales.
- Rioters attack U.S. Vice-President Nixon in Venezuela
- President Eisenhower sends troops to Lebanon.
- Yemen announces it will join the United Arab Republic.
- Venezuela imposes restrictions on U.S. oil companies.
- Forty-one million people visit the World's Fair in Brussels, Belgium.
- At the U.S. Embassy in London, Vice President Nixon hosts Queen Elizabeth for Thanksgiving dinner.

- After \$64,000 Question scandal an investigation into TV game shows begins.
- Governor Faubus shuts down Little Rock schools.
- The United States launches its first satellite.
- The United Press and the International News Service merges to form U.P.I.
- The National Advisory Council on Aeronautics is renamed NASA.
- The University of Pittsburgh agrees to buy Forbes Field from the Pirates.
- Elvis Presley is inducted into the Army.
- Air Force Academy opens.
- Union Square in San Francisco becomes a state historical landmark.
- Credit cards get a boost; American Express debuts, as does the BankAmericard, the forerunner of Visa.
- Pizza Hut opens in Kansas City, MO.
- Unemployment in the U.S. reaches highest mark since 1941.
- Gibson patents the Flying V Guitar.
- First class mail goes from three to six cents per ounce.
