The Concert Crchestra, directed by Walter Freedman, is one of the fine music groups at Taft. The members receive major credit for two periods a day; minor credit for one period a day, and service awards for non-credit membership.

THE FALL CONCERT

December 2, 1955

After thirteen weeks of intensive practice, the Symphonic Band and the Symphonic Orchestra played its second concert in the Stainmatz High School Auditorium. They thrilled an audience of twelve hundred Taltites, parents and friends.

The archestra exhibited its talents by playing seven selections, including the spectacular trumpet tria, "Bugler's Holiday", by Al Boetz, Ron Treadway, and Haward Mattick.

The band, boosting ninety members, mastered nine numbers. The jazz selection, "Dry Bones", proved the hit of the night when a repeat performance was demanded by a slapping, whistling, and yelling audience. Joyce Sabus and Marilyn Treadway interpreted and executed the highlights of the number by rising from their graves and dancing to the swing tempo in their bones.






