

it to the knowledge of the ages, he will receive the respect and admiration of men the world over.

Another might start on the same road but turn off when he finds the drudgery of learning not for him. He may start in some small business or profession. A third man may start on any one of a thousand such roads and sometime before he reaches the end, he too, may turn off saying "This is too difficult for me." Just Ponce de Leon searched for the Fountain of Happiness and failed. They have failed because they sought the byproduct and not the goal.

Taft Is 20 Years Young

Spirit High **Since 1939**

Next week ends the 20th academic year of Taft High School.

"How different," one might write, "is the large school of 1959 to the small one of 1939."

That statement just isn't so

though.

Why? Well, for one reason, the enrollment in 1939 was larger than it is now. At present Taft has 2,285 students. The Taft Tribune, Volume 1, Number 1, dated October 26, 1939, states, "There are 1,250 girls, 1,050 boys, and 74 teachers at Taft."

That first number of the Taft Tribune contains an account of the point award system, which has remained substantially unchanged in 20 years.

Hall Guards Not New

The article about hall guards in that first Trib could be reprinted almost exactly to present the present hall guard situation. Take these paragraphs, for instance:

"All visitors to the building are guided by the hallguards to the office and strangers or prowlers are kept out of the halls, thus preventin gany type of disturbance. For this reason, hallguards will insist upon you having a pass or permit signed by your teacher before allowing you out in the hall during class periods."


"To the hallguards goes the credit for keeping order in the halls. A worthy service is performed for the good of everyone in the school. Will you do your best to cooperate with them in everyway and start to develop leadership for Taft among the other high schools of the city? Do your part in putting Taft ahead."

Mr. Miller Teaches Bunting

Taft's baseball tradition goes back to the very first year of the school. "Coach Miller," the first Trib reports, "spent the last practice showing the boys the almost forgotten art of bunting. (Major leagues take notice.)"

The first meeting of Taft's GAA took place October 24, 1939. under the sponsorship of Mrs. Margaret Walker, department head.

The first Trib had its gossip column, Taft Tattler, which opened with this warning: "Ah! yes! There TAFT SPIRIT
